### **June Bullock**

January 9, 1956-December 23, 2010

Worked with youth in her parish, St. Faiths', Cutler Bay, and throughout the diocese: member of diocesan Youth Commission, longtime leader and advisor to the parish youth group, member of the school board at St. Thomas Episcopal Day School in Coral Gables. Nurse at Jackson-Memorial Hospital for over twenty years and was named Nurse of the Year three times; served as a camp nurse for the combined Southeast/Southwest Florida summer youth camp sessions at DaySpring, the camp and conference center of the Diocese of Southwest Florida.

### **Canon Caroline Brumbaugh**

April 6, 1945-February 6, 2011

Honorary canon of Trinity Cathedral and lay leader at St. Thomas, Coral Gables. Had served as a member of the Chapter of Trinity Cathedral and was instrumental in establishing Friends of Trinity Cathedral, the organization that raises funds for the restoration and preservation of the Cathedral's historic building. She was the "first Friend" of the Cathedral, giving the first donation to the newly formed group. In 2007 she was named an honorary canon of the cathedral. At St. Thomas, Brumbaugh was a founder of the MOMS group (Moms Offering Mutual Support) and active in Education for Ministry (EFM) and Stephen Ministry. She led a regular Wednesday morning Bible study, was an Ignatian Retreat leader for the parish, served as a trained spiritual director, and was a lay reader and chalice bearer. She also served on a number of diocesan committees and had chaired the diocesan Commission on Ministry.

### **Harriet Norman**

1927-February 23, 2011

Widow of Fr. Fred Norman, rector of St. Kevin's, Opa-locka, from 1973 to 1983; joined the Diocesan Staff in 1985 as secretary to the Canon for Ministry and served as Interim Deployment Officer from 1991 to the fall of 1992. After retirement from the diocesan position, took over management of the Trinity Cathedral Bookstore, making it a substantial contributor to the cathedral's income and a ministry to the diocese and the community. She retired from that work in 2003.

**The Rev. Perry Fuller**

August 30, 1935-July 7, 2011

Director of the Diocesan School for Christian Studies since 2007. Had served as interim at St. Matthew the Apostle, Miami; Holy Sacrament, Pembroke Pines; and Bethesda-by-the-Sea, Palm Beach. Was a member of the Commission on Ministry; led retreats and workshops on Benedictine spirituality and contemplative prayer, and was often sought as a spiritual director.

**Braulio Peruyero**

April 1, 1933-August 8, 2011

Leader in the Hispanic/Latino community of the Episcopal Church, known for his work with VIA (*Viviendo la Identidad Anglicana*), an education program to introduce Latinos to the Episcopal Church. A native of Cuba, he was one of the founders—and several times senior warden--of San Francisco de Asis, Miami Lakes (now part of the shared ministry of St. Margaret's and San Francisco de Asis). He was also a cursillista for more than 30 years, serving on cursillo teams in Honduras and the Bahamas, as well as in Florida.

**The Rev. Geoffrey Evans**

March 14, 1938-September 18, 2011

Came to Southeast Florida in 1976 as rector of Holy Comforter, Miami; subsequently served as rector of St. Martin's, Pompano Beach, and St. Ambrose, Ft. Lauderdale, and in retirement, as interim at St. Mary Magdalene, Coral Springs. He was an active cursillista, serving on many weekend teams; served on the diocesan Hispanic Affairs Commission and the board of Bishop Gray Inn; and taught in the Diocesan School for Christian Studies. He was one of the founders of Trinity Episcopal School (now Palmer Trinity School) in Miami. He chaired the Agenda Committee of the Executive Board, and served as Broward Dean and as secretary of Diocesan Convention. As a member of the diocesan Planning Committee in the late 1990s, he suggested the six areas of ministry—administration, communications, education, growth and evangelism, youth and young adult, and human needs—that are still a major organizing principle for our diocesan budget process.
